The publication has been designed by the South Gloucestershire LGBTQ+ Equality Network; a partnership of local organisations led by the Diversity Trust.

The partnership is working to improve access to services for our local LGBTQ+ communities, making employers more LGBTQ+ inclusive and representative, and puts on community-based events throughout the year.



LGBT / LGBT+ / LGBTQ - initials which describe Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trans and Questioning. Sometimes the "Q" stands for Queer used as a reclaimed word. The "+" symbol acknowledges the inclusion of a range of gender and sexual minority identities including: asexual, gender-fluid, intersex, non-binary and pansexual.

Over the last 20 years it has been my privilege to serve our community in a wide variety of roles including as a School Governor, Parish Councillor, South Gloucestershire Councillor, Parliamentary Candidate and even as our 'first citizen' of South Gloucestershire as Chair of Council.



The public, the media, my political colleagues and my opponents alike have always been extremely supportive about me being a gay man in public office. As Chair of Council, my partner and I were always made to feel welcome at every event we attended during an extremely busy term of office representing South Gloucestershire.

I hope all our LGBT+ residents who doubt they can play a full part in our community will be encouraged by my wholly positive experience."

Being an ally to the LGBTQ community is an non-negotiable for me. Valuing inclusion, integrity and open-heartedness means nothing if I refuse to be visible. And life, in my experience, has a way of providing us with exactly the right conditions to teach us what we need to learn. As the mother of a gay son and bi daughter, and grandmother to a trans



child, my identity as a cisgender heterosexual woman has expanded to embrace the perfect individualities of those I love. Their differences from me, have become gateways to growth and meaning for me. As an ally, this is the transformative narrative I seek to share with anyone, in any set of circumstances."

I moved to Bristol around a year ago to start working at Southern Brooks Community Partnerships on a project with children and young people in South Gloucestershire schools. I help young people to understand about diversity, we talk about all the Protected Characteristics covered by the Equality Act 2010 and I encourage



young people to take the lead in tackling prejudice and discrimination. I love the job and have had so many positive interactions, it's great to work with schools who are dedicated to making sure everyone is welcome in their communities. I am bisexual and moved here to be with my girlfriend. Excitingly we have now bought a house and just got engaged. We plan to make the area our home and will continue to make sure that it is a great place to live for everyone!"

Coming out as Transgender is hard. There is fear of rejection and ridicule (or even violence). Even now, as a non-transitioning TG person who lives part male, part female, I am selective as to whom I tell.

I run the Bristol Crossroads TG Support Group to provide a safe, private, friendly, social space for TG and gender questioning people of all kinds. It is



somewhere you can express yourself, get advice and help and gain confidence. When/if you're ready for the next step, we have links to the more public events.

We also welcome partners and close family members because they too need support.

As for myself, when I am out and about as Lauren, it is so fulfilling to interact with others naturally, as if I was no different and so help to normalise the role of TG people in society."



Transgender - Trans is an umbrella term for people whose gender identity and / or gender expression differs in some way from the sex they were assigned at birth.

Non-Binary - A person whose gender isn't wholly male or wholly female all of the time. They can be a combination of male and female, flow between these binaries, or have no gender at all. They may prefer a gender-neutral pronoun such as "they", "their", or simply use their name.

In my role it is really important for me to be out as Lesbian and to create a safe-space to encourage others to be out as well



Since 2010 NBT has celebrated LGBT History Month with keynote speakers, like Gethin Roberts (Lesbian and Gays Support the Miners) and Peter Tatchell.

We also make sure that LGBT staff and patients are treated with the same respect and dignity as anyone else. This can be through our policies, but more importantly, through our good practice. We have 2 Charters of 10 Standards that support LGB and T staff separately.

The Trust has signed up and become a key player in the Bristol LGBT+ Manifesto, is working with partners from other public bodies and private companies to develop best practice at work, and the Bristol Equality Charter.

All of our LGBT work is supported by our Chief Executive, Andrea Young."

In the past year we have worked hard to raise awareness of hate crime among agencies, community groups and residents - we still have huge underreporting of hate crime especially by LGBTQ+ communities. The effects of hate crime are very damaging, can be long-lasting and have serious consequences for victim's mental and physical health.

We've also played an instrumental role in developing the South Gloucestershire LGBTQ+ Network, which is designed to champion the cause of the LGBT+ communities in South Gloucestershire. We are so proud that this is now off the ground and will continue to support its work in any way we can".

Did you know Avon and Somerset Police has a team dedicated to supporting the LGBT+ community?


The Avon and Somerset policing area is vibrantly diverse and our policing should reflect the needs of all our individual communities. We have a significant LGBT+ community in our Force area and the area attracts LGBT+ visitors from across the country and abroad.

We're looking at new and innovative ways to engage with the LGBT+ community, including the development of a new microsite on our Force website.

In developing the microsite, we're gauging the views of the community, our partner agencies and licensees of LGBT+ venues from across the area. Our primary aim is to give people direct contact with our team to access general advice and support.

We're deeply passionate about LGBT+ issues within the Avon and Somerset policing area and are continuously working together with the community and other agencies to bring about positive change, build stronger and safer communities and achieve better outcomes for LGBT+ victims of crime and anti-social behavior."

Children today don't know how lucky they are, I bet you hear that a lot.

For me as an ex service man of 25 years homosexuality was still illegal until the year 2000, so you see, it's only children leaving school now who have truly lived in an inclusive and tolerant Britain. I have been passionately involved in local, national and international LGBT/non-binary matters for police and our lovely public for my entire service.



In my own time I am an active member of the National Trans Police Association this is all about our members and I love being there, helping and supporting trans, non binary Colleagues. I'm also The Ambassador for Trans Progression with the European LGBT Police Association, in this flattering role I, on my days off, have the absolute privilege to be able to go all over Europe advising on law, policies, best practices and so on.

I regularly meet with local trans groups this is mostly socially for me but of course now and then I'm supporting trans victims when they need it most, be that simply holding a hand or supporting in a more formal police sense, and the best thing of all I'm always making so many lovely friends along the way."

Life at Curo is pretty amazing.

It has a working atmosphere that I have never experienced in my entire working life and at 46 that's a good number of years! Curo's moral ethics and clearly defined policies helped in allowing me to build the courage and transition within the workplace without fear of reprisal or



discrimination. Being the first openly trans person in the workplace here meant there was a lot of positive learning from both sides and all parties.

A lot of large companies want to be an all-inclusive company and their policies read to that effect but sadly not in practice and for some it is just a tick box exercise - thankfully this isn't the case here at Curo.

Not only have Curo allowed me a new lease of life but the freedom I have within myself has opened up endless possibilities. These possibilities are free flowing ideas on work streams and projects, ability to work on more complex tasks and an ever growing enthusiasm to repay the debt of finally being able to be me without fear of retribution."

'Many older people who identify as LGBT have had to live through times when homosexuality was illegal, which in some professions was still the case until relatively recently. This has meant that they have been unable to come out (or chosen not to) and have had to live through great challenges as a result, often through indirect, institutionalised prejudice and discrimination."


